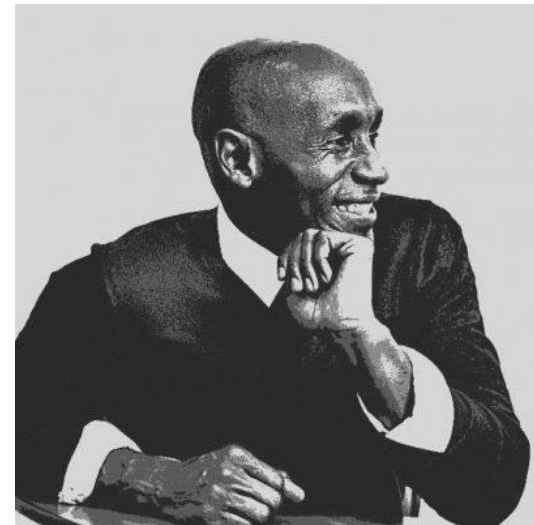

The Trauma of Mass Incarceration: How do we EVOLVE?

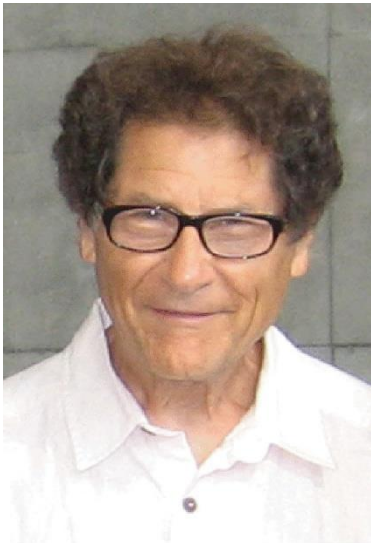
9:00- 10:00 am: Kirk Anthony James, PhD, New York University Clinical Assistant Professor at the NYU Silver School of Social Work. His work “The Invisible Epidemic in Social Work Academia,” examined the complex phenomena of mass incarceration through a historical and contemporary lens. He focuses on deconstructing issues of mass incarceration — specifically as it pertains to trauma, cognitive development, culpability, and the examination of systems that foster and perpetuate racial injustice.

10:05- 11:05 am: Keynote Speaker Nancy Chodorow, PhD, Harvard University Lecturer of Psychiatry. A sociologist and psychoanalyst who taught for years at the University of California and is now at Harvard. Her 1978 landmark book, *The Reproduction of Mothering: Psychoanalysis and the Sociology of Gender* was chosen by *Contemporary Sociology* as one of the ten most influential books of the last quarter century. Some of her other books also address psychoanalysis and feminism, including *Individualizing Gender and Sexuality: Theory and Practice*, *Feminism and Psychoanalytic Theory*, *The Power of Feelings: Personal Meaning in Psychoanalysis, Gender and Culture*, and *Femininities, Masculinities, Sexualities: Freud and Beyond*.

Loray Daws, PhD, Registered Clinical Psychologist with the Health Professions Counsel of South Africa and a Registered Psychologist with the College of Psychologists of British Columbia, Canada. He graduated from the University of Pretoria and served as a full time lecturer from 1998 to 2006. Since formally leaving the University of Pretoria he completed a three year post- graduate certificate in Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy for the disorders of self (personality disorders) and serves as faculty member at the International Masterson Institute for Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy in New York since 2010.

Keri Cohen, LCSW, Board Certified Diplomate (BCD) in Clinical Social Work. She has worked in a wide range of settings since 1991, mostly in outpatient therapy, collaborating closely with psychiatrists and other mental health professionals. She graduated of the University of Pennsylvania School of Social Policy and Practice where she earned a Master's degree in Clinical Social Work. After graduate school Keri Cohen enrolled in a two-year post master's program, earning a certificate in child and adolescent therapy from Bryn Mawr Graduate School of Social Work.

Robin Bagai, Psy.D. is a Licensed psychologist in Oregon. He has practiced clinical psychology in Portland, Oregon since 1990 and in 2015 began leading weekly seminars on the work of Michael Eigen. To date, ten of Eigen's books have been studied in these seminars.
